When Senior Independence Hospice was developing its first newsletter, the editorial team knew that the best ideas for a title would most likely come from the people who have experienced hospice directly. So a contest was developed for employees throughout the Senior Independence organization, including those of non-hospice related services. We're proud to introduce our winner.

As the adult day services coordinator in Central Ohio, Brooke (pictured at right) is a believer in hospice and an advocate. She has made many referrals to hospice not only for her adult day services clients, but also for their caregivers who have become terminally ill. But she wasn't always such a fan.

Several years ago when her father was terminally ill, another hospice provider's poor service left Brooke bitter and more than a bit skeptical about the concept of hospice. Expectations were far from met, and the experience left her family with more hurt than healing.

Fast forward a few years and Brooke had been hired as a service coordinator for Senior Independence. During a staff training session, Julie Maynard, a hospice nurse, educated the service coordinators about hospice—but Brooke wanted nothing to do with it. When Julie asked if anyone in the class had ever had a negative experience with hospice, Brooke raised her hand high and told her story.

Julie listened to Brooke's experience, cried with her and hugged her. She then shared the true hospice philosophy; the support provided for families, the control and choice given to patients, the comfort and assurance to erase fear, and the opportunity for families to heal. In that moment, Julie took all of Brooke's coldness toward hospice and turned it into warmth.

"I see how it helps, how it heals, how it loves, and especially how it allows people to grow," says Brooke. "It only took a moment for me to hate hospice, and it took one hug to love it."



Brooke's winning submission for a newsletter title was *Footprints*, a name that mirrors the effect hospice has had on her life. The newsletter team kept coming back to this name, certain that the idea was on target, yet wanting to make sure that the name could be something each reader could relate to in his or her own personal way. The idea inspired the team, and the *Impressions* title was born. Thanks, Brooke, for your wonderful idea!

However, Sandy visited Micki every day and slowly gained her confidence. Micki lived out her remaining time in her own way, making her own choices all along the way—including wearing the same pair of red pajama pants every day.

When Micki passed away, Sandy asked Micki's sister, Martha, if she could have the red pants. Sandy used the pants to make a small quilt with embroidered images that represent both sisters' varied interests and passions.

Martha moved into a smaller house at Mount Pleasant, and Sandy gave her the quilt as a very special housewarming gift.

What a wonderful way to process grief while helping another through her own.

11th Hour Volunteer

Lois has been a hospice volunteer for more than a year, saying "yes" more often than "no" when called upon. She is a Stephen Minister and has completed the 11th Hour training.

11th Hour Volunteers receive specialized training on the end of life stages, including physical and spiritual changes, as well as grieving and coping techniques. Lois' passion is to support family members and patients at the end of life vigil, and one day this busy retiree cleared her schedule to do just that.

Lois arrived at the patient's room and saw his daughter sitting in a corner, far from his bedside. Lois moved up beside the bed and quietly added her comforting presence to the room. As she

noticed the patient's breathing changing, Lois told the daughter that it was time.

The daughter came over and told her father that she loved him, that she would watch over her mother, and that it was okay for him to let go—they would be alright. In what seemed like just a moment, her father died.

The daughter was grateful to Lois, saying that she would have missed an opportunity that could never be found had Lois not encouraged her.

Lois, too, was exceptionally touched by this moment. To be used by God is one of the greatest blessings anyone can ever have and on this day, Lois knew this was her role as a volunteer for Senior Independence Hospice.

Hospice Myths & Realities

Myth: Hospice is a place.

Reality: Hospice care usually takes place in the comfort of an individual's home, but can be provided in any environment in which a person lives (e.g. a nursing home or assisted living facility).

Myth: Hospice is only for cancer patients.

Reality: A large number of hospice patients have congestive heart failure, Alzheimer's disease or dementia, chronic lung disease or other conditions.

Myth: Hospice means that the patient will soon pass away.

Reality: Receiving hospice care does not mean giving up hope or that death is imminent. The

earlier an individual receives hospice care, the more opportunity there is to stabilize a patient's medical condition and address other needs.

Myth: Patients can only receive hospice care for a limited amount of time.

Reality: The Medicare benefit, and most private insurance, pays for hospice care as long as the patient continues to meet the criteria necessary. Patients may come on and off hospice care as needed.

Myth: Hospice is just for the patient.

Reality: Hospice focuses on comfort, dignity and emotional support. The quality of life of the patient, and also family members and other caregivers, is the highest priority.

Donor Supports Hospice With Life Income Gift

An artist with an aptitude for accounting, Jaye Harris (pictured at right) has spent her career crunching numbers and her life making art. Her true legacy, however, is altruism.




